What IS a responsible citizen?

All of us now follow our values in school, which means, in part, we are being responsible citizens.

Definition:

Civic Responsibility' - a productive, responsible, caring and contributing member of society.

Responsible citizens 'are change agents against social, economic and environmental injustices'.

Responsible citizens 'show respect and follow rules of their community'.

Responsible citizens 'are a responsible, caring and contributing member of society'.





So, what does that mean for us?

As you become older, you have increasing responsibility to become a responsible citizen.

You have more ownership over your actions, will see injustice around you and have more power to change those issues.

How can I show I am responsible?

Behaving responsibly is a big part of our lives. It is important that we understand the significance of being responsible and how it can affect us as individuals and other people.

An advocate for change!

A change advocate is someone who promotes and supports change, and champions their efforts toward making the change happen.

Think about something that you believe needs changing in the community around you, or the wider world.

How could we, as children, make a change?

First, it is important to choose a cause that is relevant or meaningful for you.

- The environment
- Poverty
- Children who need education
- Healthy eating
- A community concern too many houses, unsafe road which needs traffic lights, libraries are being closed down.
- Recycling



Think about how you can help that cause in the best way you can:

The environment - join your local Wildlife Trust, or become a member of the National Trust/RSPB etc.

Poverty - Donate money to charity, donate to food banks or raise money for them.

Children who need education - become a partner school, donate school equipment, raise money for a school to help them provide.

Healthy eating - write to supermarkets, create a 'healthy eating' project in school, research advice of experts and campaign to implement it in school.

Recycling - set up recycling points, educate others about why it is important.

At Hazel Wood, we have a scheme called 'The Character Development Programme'. Showing that you're a responsible in the community will award you points.
